**reprimand** a severe or formal reproof

**reproach** a cause or occasion of blame or disgrace, disgrace, discredit the act of reproaching, rebuke.

**republic** (ri'peb-lik) government having a chief of state who is not a monarch and is usually a president. a government in which supreme power is held by the citizens entitled to vote and is exercised by elected officers and representatives.

**republican** (ri.pub'lli.kan) Pertaining to or having the character of a republic; consonant with the principles of a republic; pertaining or relating to the Republican Party. One who favors or prefers a republican form of government; a member of the Republican party

**repudiate** (ri.pu.de'at) To reject as not valid or not binding; to cast away or disown; to disavow; to refuse to acknowledge or pay, as a debt.

**repudiation** (re.pu'de.a'shan) The act of repudiating; state

or condition of being repudiated; rejection; refusal on the part of a government to pay debts.

**repugnance** (ri.pug'nans) The state of being opposed or of feeling aversion; a feeling of strong dislike or objection; inconsistency or incongruity.

**repugnant** (ri.pug'nant) Highly distasteful; offensive; objectionable; contrary, as in character; standing or being in opposition

**repulse** (ri.puls') To repel; to drive back, to refuse, reject, or rebuff by discourtesy or coldness. The condition of being repelled or driven back by force; the act of driving back; a rejection; refusal; denial.

**rescript** (re'skript) The answer or decision of a Roman emperor to some matter set before him; the decision by a pope of a question officially propounded; and edict or decree; a requiting.

**rescue** (res'ku) to free from confinement, danger, or evil; save; to take by forcible or illegal means from lawful custody. The act or an instance of rescuing.
