imaging (im'e jing) 1. to transform (data) into an exact replica in a different form, as changing digital data to pixels for display on a CRT. 2. a likeness or imitation of a person or thing, a visual counterpart of an object formed by a device, to describe or portray in words.

imagery ('im-ij-e-re) the art of making images, figurative languages, mental images, the products of imagination. Images in general or collectively; the imagination's process or the resulting mental images; the formation of pictorial images or the images themselves; the use of figures of speech, usually by writers and speakers; figurative language or description.

imaginable (im'aj-e-ne-bel) capable of being imagined or conceived.

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imagism (im'a jiz) a movement in poetic technique originating around 1909, marked by its use of clear, concrete images rather than symbolism, and free verse as opposed to the more restricted traditional, metric forms.

imagining (im-'ajning) to form a mental picture of something not present

imbalance (im'bal-ens) lack of balance, the state being out of equilibrium or out of proportion, faulty coordination of glands or muscles, as in the ocular muscles; lack of numerical proportion between men and women in a population unit.

imbecile (im-be-sil) One who is mentally deficient; a fool; a person having an intelligence quotient between 25 and 50 or a mental age of about seven. Mentally feeble; with mental faculties greatly impaired, foolish.

imbibe (im.bib') To drink in; to absorb; to receive or admit into the mind and retain, to drink to absorb.

imbroglio (im bro'l'yo) An intricate and perplexing state of affairs; a complicated or difficult situation; a misunderstanding or disagreement of a complicated nature, as between persons or nations; a confused heap.

imitation (im'i.ta'shan) the act of imitating; that which is made or produced as a copy; a likeness; a counterfeit; mimicry; the process of being stimulated to act by the observation of another's performance; a work which is patterned after another author's style; the repetition of a melodic idea by different parts or voices in a composition, made to resemble that which is genuine, original, or superior; as jewelry.

immaculate (im-ak-ye-et) being without stain or blemish, spotlessly clean, free from moral blemish or impurity; without flaw or error, without spots or colored marks; unicolor.

immobilize (i.mo'bi.liz') To make immovable, to restrain movement of, as the body or a bodily part, as part of a surgical or corrective procedure, to make incapable of action.
