**barograph** (bar'o graf) a self-registering barometric instrument for recording variations in the pressure of the atmosphere.

**barometer** (ba-rom'i-ter) an instrument for measuring the weight or pressure of the atmosphere.

**baron** (bar'on) a title or degree of nobility; one who holds the lowest rank in the peerage: a title of certain judges or officers.

**baronage** (bar'o'nij) The whole body of barons or peers; the dignity or condition of a baron.

**baroque** (ba,rok') irregular in shape, as some pearls; artistically irregular, incongruous, or fantastic, as a style of architectural and other decoration of the 17th and 18th centuries; tastelessly odd; bizarre; grotesque.

**barouche** (ba'rosh') a four-wheeled carriage with a seat in front for the driver, and seats inside for two couples, the forward one facing backward and the rear one forward, and with a falling or folding top over the back seat.
