Being properly equipped is critical for the Fire Department of New York City. That's why the department turned to ARvee to develop a tracking system for its Mask Service Unit, which maintains an inventory of 20,000 breathing units. These units have several components including pressure assemblies, demand regulators and gas cylinders of various types and sizes. Each component has differing safety and performance testing requirements and must be handled differently in the tracking system. ARvee provided a specialized tracking system that uses radio frequency identification (RFID) technology to record a complete history for each piece of equipment including all repairs, shipping, testing, cylinder refilling and other maintenance and handling. It also alerts employees of such things as required testing and failed safety criteria with video messages, audio alarms, and digitized sound
